Body paragraph 2

Despite this, Steven Herrick's text, 'The Simple Gift', demonstrates that with support the homeless are able to form connections and find happiness. Billy is homeless because he chose to leave his home as his father was abusing him. This is a good reason to leave home, because no one should have to put up with being treated that way. The abuse is very bad, when Billy was only ten years old, his father gave him 'one hard backhander across the face...I felt the blood from my nose'. This was due to Billy breaking a window with the soccer ball, an accident. From then on, Billy says, my father 'slammed the door on my **sporting childhood**'. Billy finds shelter and friendship in Bendarat; first he finds a carriage and meets Old Bill who lives next door in another carriage; he meets a very kind librarian, Irene, who lets him shelter in the library and read books. He meets Caitlin at Maccas and they have really good friendship. Kindness helps Billy cope with the everyday trauma and crisis that homelessness brings. Both Old Bill and Phil drink alcohol to forget their pain and memories of the sadness in their lives. Old Bill drinks to forget the loss of his daughter and his wife. Alcohol plays a part as many people use it as a way to forget their pain, loneliness and tragic memories. As Old Bill says, 'my sweet lovely Jessie fell and I fell with her and I've been falling ever since'. But Old Bill and Billy need each other, Billy needs Old Bill because he is kind and shares things with him. They go to the cannery together, get a job, and Billy has a relationship with Old Bill that he never had with his father. Old Bill begins to drink less; he is doing more in his life like going to work, jumping in the river and having a wash, sharing breakfast and tells Billy about the tragedy that happened in his life. As Old Bill says, 'I hadn't drunk too much, the wine was too good to ruin' when he has dinner with Billy at Caitlin's home. He begins to enjoy being 'sober'. Old Bill now has to save Billy and he focusses on this. Old Bill gives Billy the key to his home. This gives Billy a place to live and it also gives Old Bill the freedom to go on a journey in honour of his daughter Jessie. She had always wanted to travel to 'The Great Barrier Reef', so now Old Bill can do this. The final lines of the novel show us that everyone has found happiness; despite Old Bill leaving, Billy says, 'I looked up into the sky...that Old Bill and I shared'. **Overall, despite his hardships, Billy overcomes** these with the support of others, and their kindness and love.

Some people drink because they like the taste of their alcoholic beverage, whereas others drink to get drunk.

According to the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, about two thirds of college students participate in binge drinking. Binge drinking occurs when an individual drinks excessive amounts of alcohol in a short time frame. It is one of the leading causes of alcohol poisoning.

I get it, you're young and want to have fun, but is excessive drinking really necessary? Let's get something straight, I'm not telling you not to drink. I'm simply asking that you drink in moderation.

The college student's fad for binge drinking has a lot to do with American culture. Unfortunately, a lot of American culture makes getting drunk appear like a normal thing to do. It only encourages binge drinking and contributes to the thousands of students who end up in the emergency room for alcohol poisoning (NIAAA).

Other than alcohol poisoning, drinking in excess can lead to car crashes, domestic violence, sexual assault, unintended pregnancy and, if done regularly, liver disease (Centre for Disease Control and Prevention).

Go ahead, have a drink or two but remember that your actions have consequences. For example, drinking and driving. If you plan to drink and have to be somewhere, don't drive. Instead find a designated driver. Have someone who you trust so you won't be completely vulnerable. Summary of article:

- Excessive drinking can be dangerous because it affects your mind and health. It can cause liver disease, damage to your heart and change your way of thinking. Binge drinking, having a lot of alcohol over a short period of time can cause short term and long term harmful effects. The consequences may lead to car crashes, domestic violence, sexual assault and unintended pregnancy. Our actions can have lifelong effects on ourselves, our families and others e.g. you may hit another car causing a fatality, you can have a serious injury yourself. When drinking you need to be responsible and have a designated driver, be with someone you can trust and who will look out for you. Drinking in moderation is OK providing you are responsible and in a safe place.
